Santa Fe, N.M. – Today, the New Mexico Economic Development Department announced that New Mexico MainStreet (NMMS) has been reaccredited and licensed through the National Main Street Center.

Additionally, the National Main Street Center and its partners have accredited local programs in recognition of their exemplary commitment to preservation-based economic development and community revitalization through The MainStreet Four Point Approach[™]. Yearly accreditation allows New Mexico Main Street to continue helping local communities, and allows programs to continue downtown revitalization work.

"The partnership between New Mexico MainStreet, local MainStreet revitalization organizations and their government partner helps New Mexico's downtowns transform into economically vibrant communities," said Economic Development Deputy Cabinet Secretary Jon Clark. New Mexico Main Street works with communities to offer technical assistance, build capacity, and support projects in downtown & commercial districts. Since 2003, New Mexico Main Street communities have reported: **2,285** new businesses, **379** business expansions, **8,399** new jobs, **2,638** private building rehabilitations, and **\$296,734,431** private sector reinvestment.

New Mexico Main Street evaluates local program organizational performance on an annual basis with the National Main Street Center to confirm they meet 10 national performance standards. Evaluation criteria determines that the communities are building comprehensive and sustainable revitalization efforts and

include standards such as fostering strong public-private partnerships, documenting programmatic progress, and actively preserving historic buildings.
